GOT INSTRUMENTS?

Musical Tools for Schenectady Schools is hard at work to increase the number of musical instruments available to children in Schenectady's schools. The program began one year ago to help encourage donations of pre-owned instruments for use by local students. Last year's campaign resulted in more than 150 donated instruments.

"There are so many children in Schenectady with musical dreams," said Steve Weisse, president of Schenectady Friends of Music. "The need for instruments continues to grow each year. We know there are good quality instruments tucked away in attics and storerooms that are just collecting dust, and we're hoping to put them to good use. We've got kids on waiting lists who can't afford to rent or own their own instruments. Give us an instrument today and someone will be playing it tomorrow!"

Of particular need are wind and brass instruments including clarinets, flutes, trumpets, trombones and French horns; also string instruments such as violins, violas, cellos and upright basses. Ultimately, instruments of nearly every type are welcome, along with cases and music stands.

Donated instruments—which are tax deductible—can be dropped off at Proctor's Box Office or Hermie's Music Store, 727 State Street, Schenectady. Arrangements to have instruments picked up can be made by contacting Weisse at 518.346.4266.

Friends of Music is a volunteer organization of parents, teachers and community members who want to support the music programs in the Schenectady City School District. "We want every child who desires it to have an instrument or take part in our award winning music programs," said Weisse.

Fractured fragments, jagged jazz, creeping chromatics, all evanesce into aphony.


Heavy hammers, booming thunder, hit angry scale conclusions on long, thick bass strings.

I have long been an avid fan of jazz musician interviews, whether in print, on the radio, TV or online. Typically, I find them interesting, instructive, humorous and inspiring. One of my favorites recently has been "The Jazz Session," currently available free at either http://thejazzsession.com or as a podcast on iTunes.

Therefore, I was pleasantly surprised to meet the originator/moderator, Jason Crane at one of our concerts last year. He was there to interview our headliner, saxophonist Eric Alexander. I've found Mr. Crane to be not only extremely knowledgeable about Jazz (as a professional musician, writer and broadcaster), but to have an engaging, intelligent persona. In my opinion, he's consistently adept at crafting meaningful, open-ended questions that draw out worthwhile, revealing responses. I was pleased to learn that he had recently relocated to Albany and was very familiar with our local music scene.

Crane has completed more than 200 "Jazz Session Podcasts" since its inception in 2007. He has featured a broad range of musicians on virtually every instrument. The series is sponsored by, and available at www.allaboutjazz.com/php/localnews.php or through individual memberships.

I strongly recommend supporting this excellent resource. In addition to global icons such as Sonny Rollins, Terence Blanchard, Kurt Elling and Terry Gibbs, his subjects have included talents who have thrilled A Place For Jazz audiences: Lee Shaw, Brian Patneaude, Bobby Sanabria, Eric Alexander, Patti Wicks, Karrin Allyson, Steve Kuhn, Orrin Evans, Joe Locke, Gene Ludwig and Aaron Parks.

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NEA JAZZ MASTERS 2011

The National Endowment for the Arts has named its Jazz Masters for 2011. They are Hubert Laws, David Liebman, Johnny Mandel, the Marsalis family and critic-producer Orrin Keepnews.

One of the few to specialize in the flute, **Hubert Laws** is the premier musician on the instrument in jazz. In three decades of playing, he has also mastered pop, rhythm-and-blues, and classical genres.

David Liebman's curiosity and innovation allow him to play in any style, especially on his favorite instrument, the soprano sax. His interest in education led him to found the International Association of Schools of Jazz.

Johnny Mandel is considered one of the nation's top composer/arrangers in jazz, pop and film music. The breadth and quality of his work made it possible to be recorded by a wide variety of jazz musicians and singers.

The Marsalis family, together and individually, has been enormously influential in the world of jazz as performers, composers, conductors, educators, and advocates, from the patriarch of the family, Ellis Marsalis, Jr. to his children Branford, Wynton, Delfeayo and Jason Marsalis.

Considered one of the great jazz producers in the business, **Orrin Keepnews** co-founded Riverside Records in the 1950s, recording some of the biggest names in jazz, such as Thelonious Monk and promising new artists such as Bill Evans. He has been at the forefront of producing reissues of the sessions on which he originally worked, and is known for his Grammy award-winning liner notes.
