The 2013 season of A Place for Jazz will get off to a dynamic start on September 20 with a fiery quintet co-led by trumpeter Joe Magnarelli and tenor saxophonist Jerry Weldon. These two have performed on their own several times in the Capital Region but this time they will join forces for an evening of hard-hitting and lyrical music.

A Syracuse native, Joe Magnarelli moved to New York City in 1986 and soon became a regular participant in the New York and international jazz scene. From 1987, he toured and recorded with Lionel Hampton and Brother Jack McDuff. He currently has nine records out as a leader, and has played on numerous jazz labels as a sideman. In 1990, he was a semifinalist at the Thelonious Monk International Trumpet Competition in Washington, D.C. He made his debut as a leader with 1994's "Why Not" (Criss Cross). He followed that with three other CDs on the Criss Cross label: "Always There" (1997), "Mr. Mags" (2000) and "Hoop Dreams" (2005).

He subsequently released "Persistence" (2007) and "My Old Flame" (2010), his first big band recording as a leader. He also made two albums co-leading a sextet with the legendary Philadelphia trumpeter John Swana: "Philly-New York Junction" (1998), and "New York-Philly Junction" (2003). In 2003-2006, he performed with the great Latin jazz conguero Ray Barretto's New Sextet, recording on Barretto's "Time Was, Time Is" (O+ Music), which was nominated for a Grammy.

In 2003 he was involved in a very special musical project: "Jazz @ Lincoln Center Plays the Music of Dexter Gordon." Along with fellow tenorists Jimmy Greene and Wayne Escoffery and the George Cables Trio, the sextet performed at New York's Kaplan Penthouse and also toured the U.S.

Weldon is a bandleader in his own right, leading ensembles at many of New York's jazz clubs and at jazz festivals around the U.S. He has recorded several albums under his own name, among them, "Head To Head," a swinging two-tenor date with Michael Karn on the Criss Cross Jazz label "Midtown Blues," a rousing quintet with long time collaborator Magnarelli recorded live at Fat Tuesdays in NYC, and two hardswinging dates with the late, great organist, Jerry's long-time pal, Bobby Forrester.

In his column "Dean's List" in the Daily Gazette, Irv Dean, who passed away this year, wrote about many things. In this column from 2010, he talks about how he was introduced to jazz. Irv's widow, Beverly Elander-Dean, a longtime board member of A Place for Jazz, sent it along, and the Daily Gazette graciously gave us the OK to reprint it.

In his 1998 book, "Why Sinatra Matters," Pete Hamill writes about a little late-night debate that took place in 1970 at a bar in New York City. Frank Sinatra and some pals, including newspaper types like Hamill, had gathered to socialize over drinks, and the talk turned to authors. Inevitably, the guestion came up as to who was the better writer — Hemingway or Fitzgerald? According to Hamill, saloonkeeper Jilly Russo said, "Hey, no question. Ella all the way."

The reference to the jazz icon Ella Fitzgerald made me laugh more than it might have a few years ago because lately I've come to know people like that, people whose life seems to be possessed and defined by jazz.

I'd never been a big fan of that most American of music genres. I grew up in the era of rock and roll and folk music, and also embraced classical music, including opera, as well as contemporary and Broadway classics. Jazz was more the music of my parents, and we hardly ever embrace the music of our parents, not with any enthusiasm at least.

But I do consider my musical tastes eclectic, and I like contemporary jazz artists like Diana Krall, Harry Connick Jr. and Michael Buble. The jazz of the purists, however, like the music of Billie Holiday, Ella Fitzgerald and Duke Ellington, did not engage me much. I preferred the Beatles. Things change, however.

Since moving to Schenectady, for years a city known for its jazz offerings, I've become friendly with people who love jazz and who, by including me in their outings, are broadening my musical background. (I'm still not really clear on what scatting is all about, but I'm new enough that they forgive me when I ask dumb questions.)

### A LIFE REMEMBERED: IRV DFAN

I've come particularly to enjoy jazz singers as well as the instrumentalists and their ensembles with their virtuosic solo improvisations. If you live in the Schenectady area, you're constantly discovering people whom you know through their day jobs who are jazz musicians by night. Because of the intimate venues and audiences that are respectable but not huge you can get to know these artists and become not only a fan but also a friend. I've found they're very approachable.

Over the past year, I've gotten to know and admire many of them, including the legendary jazz pianist Lee Shaw, singer Colleen Pratt (who isn't just a jazz musician but who certainly does justice to a lot of jazz standards), bassist Bill Delaney and pianist Peggy Delaney, accordionist Al Haugen and pianist Paul Mastriani.

Thanks to my growing circle of jazzy acquaintances, I've also discovered there are venues round every corner at the Van Dyck, of course, but also at the Stockade Inn and Aperitivo Bistro, Justin's in Albany and Panza's at Saratoga Lake. Over the Labor Day weekend, we drove to Tanglewood for the opening of the annual jazz festival there and heard the NPR program "Radio Deluxe" being taped, with jazz guitarist John Pizzarelli and singer Jessica Molaskey co-hosting.

On Friday, I attended one of the fall concerts of A Place for Jazz at the Unitarian Fellowship in Schenectady where the Mike Moreno Quintet was featured. They're a talented group of five young men led by guitarist Moreno, and their music is full-bodied and modern. I left soon after intermission, telling myself that each number they performed seemed to me to sound like the one before it. As I was walking out I had this sudden thought that I am becoming a jazz purist, as in old fogey. I did, however, resist the impulse to yell out, "Ella all the way!"

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# JOE MAGNARELLI - "PERSISTENCE" Review by Tom Pierce

Lovers of passionately surging and accessibly lyrical straight-ahead Jazz will understand the excitement of this observer for this spirited 2008 release (his 6th of 8 total CDs) by Syracuse native & NYC first-call trumpeter Joe Magnarelli ("Mags").

He's warmly accompanied by master baritone saxophonist Gary Smulyan, who provides wonderfully deep tonal balance to Mags' dynamic trumpet. The enormously accomplished and responsively tight rhythm section of Dave Hazeltine on piano, Peter Washington on bass and Kenny Washington (no relation) on drums delivers all the buoyant support & creative stimulation needed.

The song list is an engagingly diverse mix of three standards and five originals by the leader. One way to look at how he covers the bases is to highlight examples of the sometimes dubbed "Four B"s" of Jazz: Bop, Blues, Ballads & Bossas (Latin).

The rousing title track opener is representative of the enduring category of driving Bop/Post-Bop with all the free-wheeling swing and excitement one expects. The funky groove of "D Train Boogaloo" would probably be associated with the Blues origins of "Soul Jazz," so popular in the 1960's & 70's. The Ballad

surprisingly would NOT be one of the standards ("I Had the Craziest Dream," "Haunted Heart" or "You & the Night & the Music"), which are all interestingly taken at a medium or "up" tempo; but rather his "Ballad for Barretto," an intimately touching, warm remembrance of NEA Jazz Master percussionist Ray Barretto, who sadly and unexpectedly passed the previous year. And the "Bossa" track (my personal favorite) would be the seductively entrancing "The Village." Here the understated, but engrossing melody, intoxicating rhythmic base and relaxed solos by all involved were so well executed they quickly captured and held my attention.

Listening to this invigorating recording brought back exciting memories of my initial exposure to Mags'

electrifying playing with Joe Barna's 2010 joyful "Sketches of Influence." It also sharpened my keen anticipation of his Sept 20 APFJ season opener with his quintet, featuring Jerry Weldon on tenor sax.
