James Williams Opens Sixth Season for APFJ

New York City pianist will
open APFJ's Fall Jazz series on
September 17th. Shortlly after
this concert he'll appear at the
Blue Note in Manhattan. Mr.
Williams will appear with
appear with his sextet including
the much applauded Billy
Pierce on sax. Williams and
Pierce will be followed on
October 1 by the Paradise City
Jazz Band led by Dave Pinardi,

who some consider the Northern answer to the Dirty Dozen Jazz Band. This concert will be followed on October 15 by the return of TanaReid led by the renown bassist Rufus Reid and the award winning drummer Akira Tana. this group much praise and enthusiastic crowds in their last visit two years ago. On October 29 we introduce Papo Vasquez and his pulsating combination of traditional Puerto Rican and Afro-Cuban rhythms called Bomba Jazz. He'll appear in a sextet with the senational percussionist Milton Cardona and Mario Rivera, the spectacular saxaphonist who has often appeared with Tito

An Important Acquisition

Jazz musicians live such complicated lives that it is hard to think of them collecting the large and significant archives anticipated from writers, public figures, artists and composers. All too often their records and music publications are their footprint. The Insitute for Jazz Studies is doing 'oral history interviews'; and histories and biogrpahies help. But 'archives' are rare. Yale did acquire the Ellington Archives some years ago.*

On June 1, 1993 a press conference at the Library of Congress announced its acquisition, from Sue Gordon Mingus, Charles' widow, of the Mingus Archives. The collection contains original music manuscripts scores and parts, tapes, photographs, literary manuscripts and memorabilia. The collection is both large and important. For example, his moving 1971 autobiography <u>'Beneath the Underdog'</u> was drawn from over 1,000 manuscript pages.

Mingus' genius is clear to most. His public persona was too complicated, to many too frightening, to approach; he was intensely self aware and socially alert. And, my goodness, such beautiful music.

Archives are by definition, 'public documents.' This acquisition brings to us materials which would otherwise be unavailable; for worse, vulnerable to loss or damage. So thank you Mrs. Mingus and L.C.

And, always, thank you, Mr. Mingus.

*Editor's Note: In a recent purchase the Library of Congress acquired the bulk of Ellington's Archives including 3,000 music manuscripts.

In our last column, we talked about all the wonderful musicians that live and work in this area. I listed a random 50. I'll list some more below.

There is no argument about the quality of Jazz musicians in this area. The quality is very high. The action that needs to take place is with you, dear readers. We know there are thousands of Jazz fans out there. We see you occasionally at SPAC, Proctors and Troy Music Hall, but we do not see you in clubs and other small venues.

There were many great musicians playing at the Newport Jazz Festival. (we were real pleased to see an invitation extended to Cole Broderick and the College of St. Rose Jazz Ensemble.)

But there are some terrific musicians playing right here every week-end. And there's an opportunity for some great Jazz experiences at a very low cost. Check this out! The night before the Jazz Festival Miki and I went out for four hours of wonderful Jazz for a grand total of twelve dollars. The listening circumstances were as least as good as SPAC (I have nothing aginst SPAC, I just think that Jazz is much better upclose and personal)

In Saratoga we heard (within 50 yds walking distance) Cole Broderick at Gaffney's, Stefan Harris Trio(with Gary Wicks and Rob Cenci on drums at Maple 9,..Carl Landa Quartet with Jill Hughes (downstairs at the Metro) and Nick Brignola with his new band(upstairs at the Metro), We topped it off with listening to Jim Wilke on WAMC..Jazz After Hours (who happened to be playing Nick Brignola's Sweet Basil album

I was in Price Chopper the other day when suddenly out of the deep well of noise in the store, 'Round Midnight', one of Thelonius Monk's oldest and most popular compositions came through the store speakers. It was canned music of course, but sacre bleu, the musicians were actually

playing the right notes and even most of the right chords! No octaves for sevenths. I couldn't believe it! Later I imagined some really hip arranger stranded in MUZAK headquarters who just couldn't bear to vandalize this great work and let the original sneak through unscathed.

'Twas great having a chance to hear the Dolphins in Central Park in Schenec-tady. Mona Golub has done a wonderful job in gaining corporate support for this popular series. Lawrence, Inc, Trustco, Metroland and the Gazette helped sponsor. They sounded great The only think wrong with the Haven as a performing arts space is that it's flat in the middle of a parking lot with no shade.

This exciting quintet led by Akira Tana and Rufus Reid make a return visit to A Place for Jazz, by popular demand.


