

A Place for Jazz Announces Fifth Season

Thanks to our Jazz Angels, we are proudly beginning our sixth concert season. See page 4 and 5 for order forms and more information. The season opens on September 17 with the sensational Jazz pianist James Williams and his sextet including Billy Pierce on sax. They'll be followed on October 1 by the Paradise City Jazz Band led by Dave Pinardi.

This concert will be followed on October 15 by the return of TanaReid led by Rufus Reid and Akira Tana and the exact same lineup that drew so much praise in their last visit. On October 29 we introduce Papo Vasquez and his pulsating combination of traditional Puerto Rican and Afro-Cuban rhythms called BombaJazz. He'll appear with Milton Cardona (the percussionist and Mario Rivera (saxaphone) in a sextet.

On November 12th we close with the exciting little Big Band of the Empire Jazz Orchestra led by Bill Meckley and featuring the terrific local musicans: Leo Russo, Nate Phipps, Ken Olsen, Rob Cenci, Otto Gardner, Tom Gerbino, John Hines and Jim Corigliano. They'll be playing the big band arrangements of the last 50 years in an octet format. They were so popular last year, we just had to bring them back!

Summer of Jazz

This summer there are over 1,000 live Jazz performances taking place within a 200 mile radius of the tri-city area. Jazz Masters like Max Roach, Milt Hinton, Sheila Jordan, Benny Golson, Dave Valentin, Tito Puente, Nick Brignola, Lee Shaw, Ian McDonald, Peg Delaney, Horace Silver, Grover Washington will be within a few hours of wherever you are. And hundreds of other musicians of great talent will be at festivals and local clubs.

Not a 'No-one'

A good contemporary clarinet player has been heard to pronounce Jimmy Noone's name as 'No-one.' The respectful irony is well deserved because to many of us Noone is nowadays a little-known clarinet master.

Noone was a Creole feom New Orleans, studied there with Sidney Bechet, and moved to Chicago in 1917-18. He recorded with Oliver, Kepper and ladnier. He had a sound formal training in music, and studied in Chicago with Franz Schoepp, a symphony clarinetist who taught the young Benny Goodman. Noone's tone was beautiful; round rich notes absent of squeaks and sparing of growls.

He played lovely, balanced, melodic improvisations. He was much admired and clearly influenced many players including Barney Bigard and Buster Bailey, and a crop of swing players like Shaw and Goodman.

Unlike many over-recorded over-valued players he was under-recorded and likely under-valued. He had his own band at the Apex Club in Chicago, which recorded. (There is at least one LP.) It has Hines' 'Monday Date' and a fast 'I Know That You Know', whose clarinet solo has challenged generations of clarinetists.

Try to catch 'Apex Blues'. It is a beautiful lyrical piece with a gently elegant clarinet.

Definitely, Not a No-one.

This exciting quintet led by Akira Tana and Rufus Reid make a return visit to A Place for Jazz, by popular demand.



EMPIRE JAZZ ORCHESTRA (Octet) Friday, November 12, 8pm,


