On Ivie Anderson

One of the elegant by-products of National Holidays fixed by position rather than date is that it offers the opportunity for other people to be recognized. Martin Luther King's Day, this year, is also the birthday of Ivie Anderson, born in California, 1904.

Ms. Anderson was the singer with Duke from 1933-to 1942. They toured Europe (sensationally!) in 1933 and the band fundamentaly kept together until 1942. A 1933 London editorial described Ivie as 'singing "Stormy Weather" as you'll never hear it again.' Ivie sang in the 1937 Hollywood revue 'Jump for Joy'; and really took possession of 'Got it Bad...' and 'Don't mean a thing...'. She also appeared in the Marx Brothers' 'Day at the Races' (1937).

Her voice was full, rich and words ended with audible 'D's and 'T's. It was an astonishment to read Juan Tizol, the Ellington trombonist, recall that she was asthmatic. Tizol writes 'She'd have to go out of the hall to get fresh air. She could be feeling bad but you couldn't tell. She was terrific".

Certainly there's no clue on the records I've heard. She died on December 28, 1949. Juan is correct. She was terrific.

Diary of a Concert Season

It's that time of year again. Even though the first concert is 9 months away (September 15th), we've already started planning for the new season. By the time you've received this newsletter, the audition committee will have waded their way through 30 suggestions, listened to tapes and CDs, perused promotional material and whittled the choices down to about ten. Then Butch will call the musicians or their agents and determine their availability and their fees.

After agreements are reached, contracts are sent out, publicity material is prepared, hotel arrangements are made and the mailings and phone calls begin. It takes us about 4 months to sell enough tickets to guarantee the fees we've offered!

About two months before the first concert we recruit the ushers (we need ushers!), write programs, make final arrangements for workshops and inschool programs, make arrangements for piano tuning, sound equipment, media presentations, display ads and a final flurry of phone calls. (This year we're aiming to increase our advance sales. We'd love your help to make some of those phone calls.)

Then we meet with the Treasurer of the First Unitarian Society to schedule the various payments that must be made for musicians' fees, for rental of sound equipment, for food for the musicians, for hotel rooms and for publicity materials.

Finally we begin to educate DJs, newspapers and magazines; arrange for interviews and "on air" play and discussion of the music and artists that APFJ will present. All this is done by a score of volunteers who give a lot of time and effort to the cause of good music.

And then comes the first concert. We arrive hoping that everything goes as planned and that at least 150 of you who didn't buy season tickets will show up at the door.

Whew! I'm exhausted just thinking about it! See you soon.
